

ZONING AMENDMENT BYLAW NO. 2924, 2022

Zoning Amendment Bylaw No. 2924, 2022 proposes to rezone the properties legally described as Lot E, Sec 24, Twp 57, ODYD, Plan 21346 and Lot A, Sec 24, Twp 57, ODYD, Plan 30167 and located at 92 and 100 Begbie Road from the Non-Urban (N.U) zone to the Country Residential (C.R) zone. If successful in rezoning the properties as proposed, the owner plans to subdivide the properties into one 1 ha lot (under Section 514 of the Local Government Act), one 2 ha lot, and one 3.64 ha remainder lot.
